






BLACK HISTORY MONTH

According to ACS researchers, there will be an estimate of 1.9 million new cancer cases in the year 2021 and more than 600,000 people will die from cancer. By spreading awareness we can learn how to detect early signs and plan for treatment. World Cancer states that more than one-third of cancer cases can be prevented and the other third can be cured if detected early enough.

EARLY CANCER WARNING SIGNS:

- *Unexplained weight loss* - If you lose 1- pounds or more for no reason it could be nothing to worry about. However, this could be a sign of cancer.
- *Skin Change* - Changes in moles, yellowing of eyes or fingertips. Look for asymmetrical or jagged moles, dark in color or large and growing.
- *Pain* - Pain that does not go away and you do not know how the pain started.
- *Fever* - A fever mostly at night. No other signs of infection.
- *Fatigue* - Extreme fatigue that does not improve.

UPWARD BOUND REMINDERS


